QUICK START

Use this pack before you book and again the day before your session.

The promise

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By the end, you should know what happens, what to wear, whether you can take part, which questions to ask the venue, and exactly how to arrive prepared.

Best way to use this

- [] Read What Happens so nothing surprises you.
- [] Complete the Can I Take Part? checks.
- [] Ask venue questions before paying.
- [] Fill the Booking Snapshot once confirmed.
- [] Screenshot Arrival Checklist for the day.

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First-timer tip

Venues differ. Treat this pack as preparation, not a substitute for the venue's briefing, waivers, age rules or staff instructions on the day.

WHAT HAPPENS

A typical first visit, from arrival to the final briefing. Exact timings vary by venue.

1 Arrive early

Most venues ask you to arrive 10-15 minutes before your session for check-in and waivers.

Check in & waivers

Confirm booking, show ID if asked, and complete any liability waiver.

3 Suit up

Put on venue PPE: typically overalls/cover, gloves, eye protection and sometimes a helmet.

4 Safety briefing

Staff explain rules, stance, what you can smash, and what is off-limits.

5 Smash session

Supervised time in the room - usually around 15-30 minutes depending on package.

6 Wrap up

Return gear, take photos if allowed, and leave when staff clear the room.



Reality check

It is loud, physical and supervised. You do not need to be angry - most first-timers are there for fun, novelty or stress release.
